02 A System Centralizing Data

To centralise more precisely, locally, and timely labour market data, aiding employment, employability, and policy decisions that would promote a stronger labour market for economic growth.

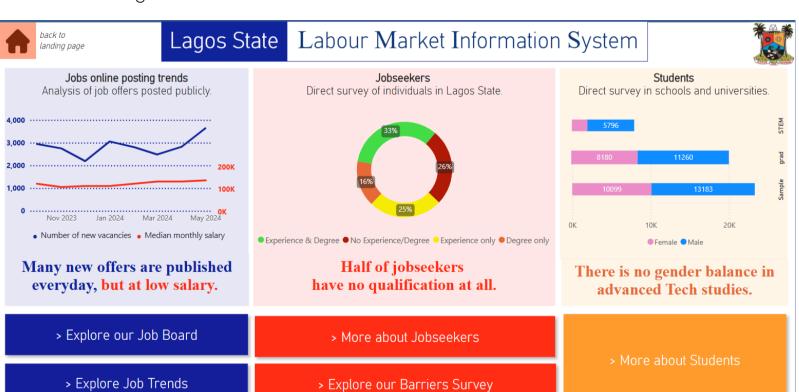
Commissioned in July 2024 by the Executive Governor of Lagos State, Mr. Babajide Sanwo-Olu, the Labour Market Information System (LMIS) is an open-source labour database developed by the Lagos State Employment Trust Fund (LSETF) in partnership with GIZ, the Ministry of Wealth Creation and Employment, and the Ministry of Economic Planning and Budget.

It provides reliable, up-to-date information on Lagos State's economic and labour market landscape. It serves as a valuable resource for government institutions, MDAs, employers, employees, and a broad network of stakeholders, supporting evidence-based planning, policymaking, and workforce development

The Importance of Public-Private Dialogue (PPD)

We coordinate PPDs for the LMIS to bring together a network of partners to discuss and validate labour market data, align policies with real workforce needs, co-create solutions for employment challenges, and build trust in the system. These sessions ensure the LMIS remains relevant, accurate, and actionable for policy and business decisions.

The 7th PPD held on August 25th 2025 focused on stakeholder contributions around Wage Management and Curriculum Content Alignment, aligned with broader labour market priorities such as salary trends, green jobs, gender equality, and opportunities across Lagos.















Key Takeaways



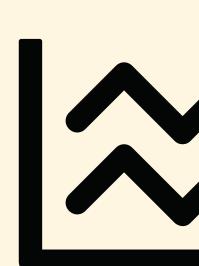


Median salaries in Lagos increased from \\$125,000 in 2024 to \\$175,000 in 2025, although inflation erodes real gains.

Employers and workers grapple with negotiating raises in the context of rising living costs.

There are variations in salaries across locations (higher in Victoria Island(VI), Yaba, remote roles; clustered opportunities in Lekki).

Salary outcomes correlate strongly with education and experience, with advanced degrees linked to higher wages.



Observations on Green Jobs

The LMIS recorded 73 job offers in this space and 137 youths trained in 2025 under the LSETF-GIZ Employability Support Project (plastic recycling, biogas production, green fashion).

This is a small but emerging sector critical to a sustainable future. We are tracking its growth and advocating for targeted support from both government and private investors to ensure it thrives

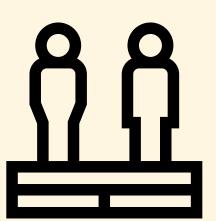


Gender Equality in Labour Markets

Persistent gender disparities remain, particularly within technology and digital sectors such as software development, data science, and cybersecurity.

Key barriers include safety and security concerns in certain industries like transportation and logistics and unequal access to digital tools in marginalised contexts including low income urban and rural communities.

Participants discussed policies and interventions such as the LSETF Female Funders & Founders Program, designed to foster greater inclusion and support women's participation in the economy.











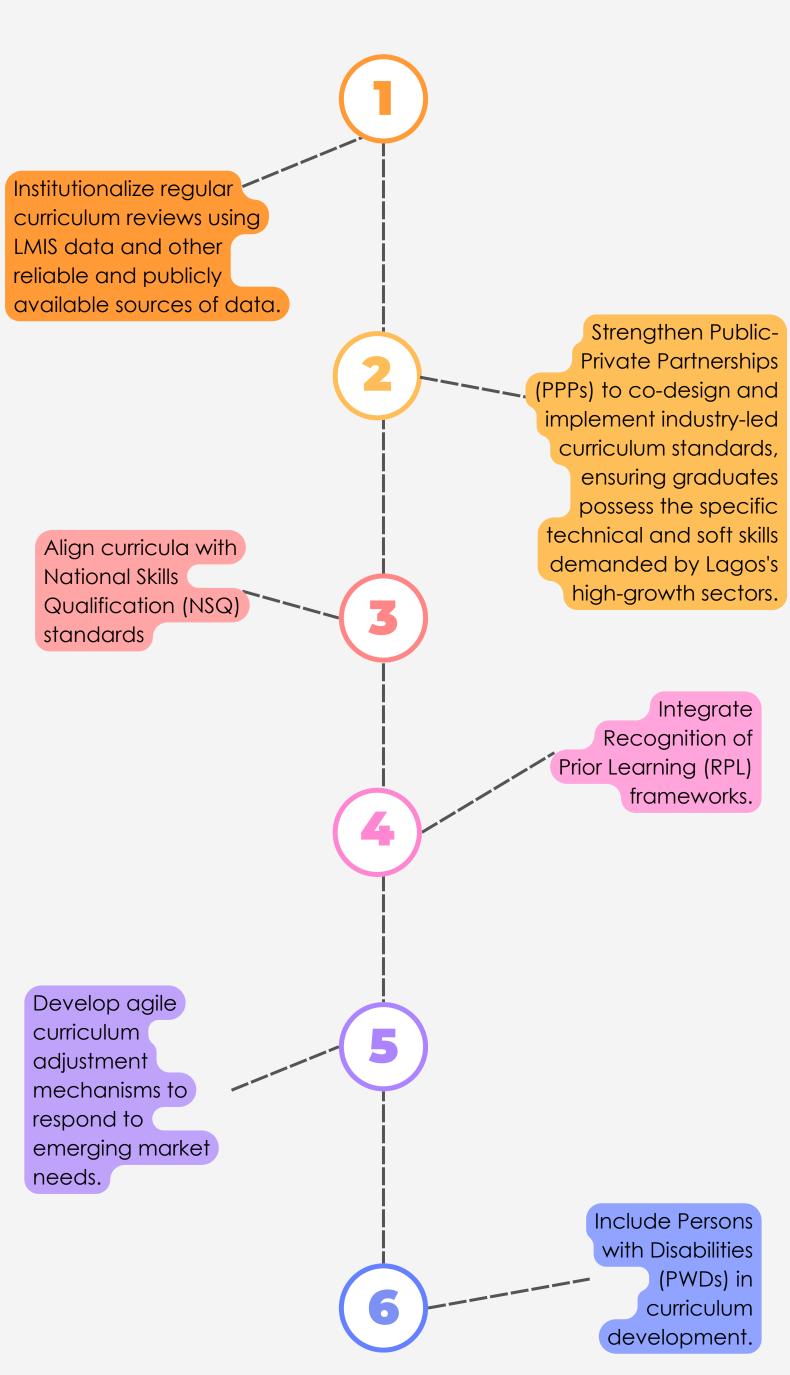

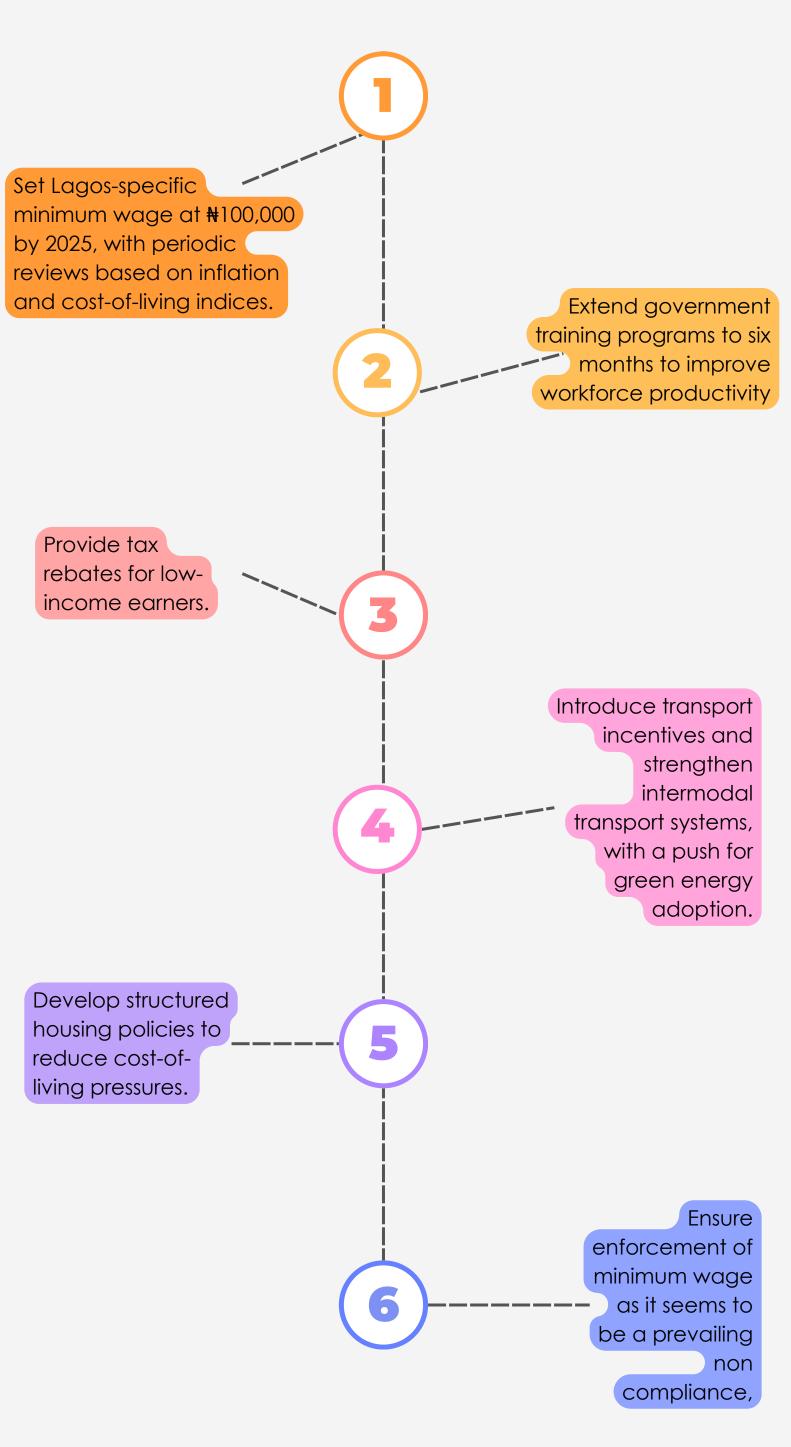
